
The Dyslexia Research Registry is located at Florida State University. It is a joint effort of four Learning Disabilities Centers in the US funded by the National Institutes of Health:

Improving Reading, Improving Learning, Improving Lives



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Is your child struggling to learn to read?

Does your child get extra help in school, but is not learning to read?

Is your child bright and curious about the world but unable to break the code of the written word?



Parents are often the first to feel that something is not right in their child's learning.

Children who continue to struggle with reading through elementary and middle school may have dyslexia.

Children who have dyslexia have difficulty reading and writing through no fault of their own. These children have the right to take part in all school activities.

Do you want to understand dyslexia better? One way is by joining the Dyslexia Research Registry.

Together we can improve reading, improve learning, and improve lives.

What is Severe Dyslexia?

It is hard for some children to learn how to read. But for a few it is even harder than most. About 5% of children with reading disabilities do not improve even with the best help. These children can do a lot of things but they struggle learning how to read. Often they have other family members who had learning problems.



The Dyslexia Research Registry wishes to serve these children with severe dyslexia.

Join the Dyslexia Research Registry

You can directly help efforts to improve our understanding of dyslexia by joining the Dyslexia Research Registry. The Dyslexia Research Registry is a national effort with centers throughout the US supported by the National Institutes of Health.



Why research?

Research will help us understand, treat and prevent dyslexia. Because people like you have taken part in research studies, we now know how to help many children who have problems learning to read.

However, more research is needed to understand how to teach children who have severe dyslexia.

How does the Registry work?

Families who join the Dyslexia Research Registry will be invited to take part in research projects on dyslexia through the National Institutes of Health Learning Disability Centers.

The Dyslexia Research Registry will contact members when studies become available. Members may then choose which studies, if any, they would like to participate in.

The results of these studies will help inform researchers and educators about treating and preventing severe dyslexia.

Benefits to You

Registry members and their families will have access to websites, organizations, books, assistive technology, and other sources of help.

These resources are screened by scientists and education experts so that the registry members have the best available information.
